 (1962) dir Terence Young w/Sean Connery, Ursula Andress, Joseph Wiseman, Jack Lord, Bernard Lee (110 min)

There's no question, the most indelible trademark of the United Artists legacy is the James Bond series. For many, the first exposure to the famous UA symbol is from the first moments of these legendary spy films, and DR. NO is the first in the series. PINK PANTHER

 (1963) dir Blake Edwards w/Peter Sellers, David Niven, Robert Wagner, Capucine, Claudia Cardinale (113 min)

When an international jewel thief (David Niven) schemes to nab the priceless Pink Panther diamond, it's up to the idiotic Inspector Jacques Clouseau (Peter Sellers) to stop him. Before the film was released Niven was thought the star but Sellers played Clouseau as a bumbling French jackass and, in the process, managed to steal the movie – and create one of the most enduring characters in comedy history.

THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY
 at 5:30
 (1966) dir Sergio Leone w/Clint Eastwood, Lee Van Cleef, Eli Wallach (160 min)

An unlikely trio of Wild West anti-heroes alternate team-up and face-off during an unremitting quest for buried treasure with Van Cleef as "The Bad", Wallach as "The Ugly" and Eastwood as "The Good." This movie is a spaghetti Westerns spectacular widescreen vistas, bravura direction, and, of course, the amazing score by Ennio Morricone.

THE MAGNIFICENT SEVEN
 NEW 35MM PRINT!
 (1960) dir John Sturges w/Yul Brynner, Eli Wallach, Steve McQueen, Charles Bronson, Robert Vaughn, James Coburn, Horst Buchholz (128 min)

This iconic Hollywood western is an American retelling of Akira Kurosawa's *THE SEVEN SAMURAI*. Translated from rural Japan to a Mexican border town, *THE MAGNIFICENT SEVEN* maintains the original story of villagers in desperate need of protection. However, in this genre remake Hollywood assembles a crew of world weary cowboys to come to the village's defense. The gang is headed by superstars Steve McQueen and Yul Brynner and rounded out by Hollywood greats such as James Coburn and Charles Bronson. Set to the iconic score of Elmer Bernstein, *THE MAGNIFICENT SEVEN* is the embodiment of the classic Hollywood western, fully and expansively portraying the genre often revisited in some of 2007's most lauded films.

RAGING BULL

 (1980) dir Martin Scorsese w/Robert De Niro, Cathy Moriarty, Joe Pesci (129 min)
 Repeatedly referred to as the best film of the 1980s, Martin Scorsese's *RAGING BULL* charts the rise and stunning fall of middle-weight champion boxer Jake La Motta whose uncontrollable temper made him a force to be reckoned with in the boxing ring but a dangerous beast outside of it. The tour-de-force direction by Scorsese includes such visual devices as having Jake fight in progressively larger rings to accentuate his diminishing career. Shot in sumptuous black-and-white.

ROCKY

 (1976) dir John G. Avildsen w/Sylvester Stallone, Talia Shire, Burt Young, Carl Weathers (119 min)
 Break out your sweat suits and crank up the Survivor. Rocky has arrived! Written by the Italian Stallion himself, Rocky (Stallone) is a struggling boxer with few prospects going for him, he is struggling with money, love, career, basically with life in general. When heavyweight champ Apollo Creed (Weathers) saunters into town, his managers immediately see a business opportunity in a battle between townie-nobody Rocky and reigning-champ Apollo. Little do they know that Rocky has more up his sleeve than just a bulging forearm or two.

CHOP SHOP

 (2007) dir Ramim Bahri w/Alejandro Polanco, Isamar Gonzales, Carlos Zapata, Alberto Rivas, Rob Nowinski (94 min)
CHOP SHOP is the story of Alejandro (Polanco), a 26-year-old Latino street orphan in Willet Point, Queens also known as the "Iron Triangle," a vibrant, sprawling, 20-block stretch of junkyards and chop shops, overshadowed by Shea Stadium's giant billboard. "Make Dreams Happen." Working at one of the many auto body shops that line the street, Alejandro spends his days in an adult world, running errands, convincing customers to come to his boss's garage instead of a competitor's, and learning how to paint and repair cars.

Alejandro's hopes for the future lie in the much-anticipated arrival of his older sister Isamar (Gonzales) and a scheme to buy and repair a rundown food-van. With a mixture of chiding, naïveté and adult ambivalence, Alejandro begins bravely saving his money while making moves in him in a tiny room perched in the back of the shop where he works. But when their dream, and their loving relationship, is threatened by the hard truths of life, work, and one another, the children find themselves forced to make the kinds of difficult decisions that most adults never have to face.

Shooting with the honesty and beauty of an Italian neo-realist film, director Ramim Bahri has artfully followed up with his acclaimed debut feature *Man Push Cart* with a film that exposes the all-too-real possibility that for many Americans, the "Land of Opportunity" is more like a third world country than most would care to admit. Despite some heart-breaking scenes, *CHOP SHOP* is a film filled with the simple wonders and honest characters of everyday life – and the hope that the American dream is not a thing of the past.

SOOTH ANIVERSARY!
TOUCH OF EVIL
 at 3:15, 7:30
 (1958) dir Richard Brooks w/Elizabeth Taylor, Paul Newman, Burt Ives (88 min)
 In this adaptation of Tennessee Williams's famed play, Elizabeth Taylor stars as Maggie "the Tall" Pollitt, the sultry, working class wife of drunken ex-football star Brick (Paul Newman). On hot Southern evening, Brick's family assembles to celebrate the final birthday of his patriarch. In classic Williams's style the estranged relatives struggle for their father's favor and fortune while tensions mount and family secrets are revealed. Steamy, tense and dramatic *CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF* is Taylor and Williams at their best.

SOOTH ANIVERSARY!
TOUCH OF EVIL
 at 3:15, 7:30
 (1958) dir Orson Welles w/Welles, Charlton Heston, Janet Leigh, Akim Tamiroff, Marlene Dietrich (108 min)
 Starring the late Charlton Heston as, improbably, a Mexican police detective named Mike Vargas, *TOUCH OF EVIL* stands as one of the great crime thrillers of the 1950s. Vargas and his new bride find their honeymoon disrupted by, among other things, a politically-motivated murder, a swaggering, corrupt cop (Welles in one of his most iconic roles), and a drug-addled gang of motorcycle thugs. This is one of those movies that just doesn't travel to the small screen – with it's inky shadows and smoky interiors, it can only be truly appreciated on the big screen.

Wednesday, May 7
JUDGMENT AT NUREMBERG
 at 8:00pm
 (1961) dir Stanley Kramer w/Spencer Tracy, Burt Lancaster, Marlene Dietrich, Judy Garland, Montgomery Clift (186 min)
 Not for the faint of heart or those on a tight schedule, *JUDGMENT AT NUREMBERG* takes place three years after the head leaders of the Nazi party have been tried for their crimes. Four judges are now on trial, accused of using their offices for sterilization purposes of the Nazis's reign. As the trial attempts to delve deep into their crimes, Judge Haywood (Tracy) finds that not only is information hard to come by, but even the US government is less than thrilled at the prospect of another lengthy trial, preferring instead to put all Nazi-related matters behind them. Through countless recollections of the horrors of the Nazi regime, and of these four defendants in particular, Judge Haywood comes to form a picture of the atrocities committed, eventually being able to sentence them in the manner in which they deserve.

Thursday, May 8
IN THE HEAT OF THE NIGHT
 at 7:15
 (1967) dir Norman Jewison w/Sidney Poitier, Rod Steiger (109 min)
 Philadelphia homicide detective Virgil Tibbs (Poitier), back home in rural Mississippi to visit his mother, finds himself at the center of a murder investigation – first as an indignant suspect and then as an unwilling advisor to the bigoted sheriff (Steiger). Poitier's stardom was so revered by the white Southern establishment that he refused to film in Mississippi fearing for his safety – despite this, the film went on to win five Academy Awards, including Best Picture.

TWELVE ANGRY MEN
 at 5:15, 9:30
 (1957) dir Sidney Lumet w/E.G. Marshall, Henry Fonda, Ed Begley (96 min)
 A minimalist epic if there ever was one. What seems like an open shut case regarding patricide in a Spanish-American household turns into a discourse on each of the twelve jurors' own fears and prejudices. Immediately, all but Juror 8 (Fonda) vote guilty, each juror seemingly being able to back up his vote with factual evidence. However, as the group continues to deliberate on the guilt or innocence of the defendant, the hidden prejudices and personality flaws of the jurors themselves come to the surface and effect the final verdict in the most unexpected of ways.

Friday, May 9
BIRDMAN OF ALCATRAZ
 at 7:00
 (1962) dir John Frankenheimer w/Burt Lancaster, Karl Malden, Thelma Ritter, Telly Savalas (147 min)
 One of the most iconic movies made live films together and *BIRDMAN* is one of their best. Though Frankenheimer is best known for thrillers (like the excellent *Seconds* or *MANCHURIAN CANDIDATE*), *BIRDMAN* is a film of intense stillness about a man convicted of murder, sentenced to spend life in solitary confinement who finds a new direction in life in the study of birds. Lancaster's outstanding performance was highly celebrated at the time and remains one of the actor's finest achievements.

THE MANCHURIAN CANDIDATE
 at 4:30, 9:45
 (1962) dir John Frankenheimer w/Frank Sinatra, Laurence Harvey, Janet Lee, Angela Lansbury (126 min)
 This legendary political thriller seemed early release in the wake of JFK's assassination the year after its premiere and it remains a potent film to this day. Raymond Shaw (Harvey) returns from the Korean War a decorated hero, however, no one can seem to remember exactly what he has to do towards the Medal of Honor. Army Officer Bennett Marco (Sinatra) questions the truth of Shaw's war-time deeds, refusing to accept round-about explanations. Marco's continued nightmares about Shaw, and those of another in his unit, force him to investigate, eventually leading to a vast political conspiracy that is at first unbelievable, and then undeniable.

Saturday, May 10
THE GREAT ESCAPE
 at 6:00
 (1963) dir John Sturges w/Steve McQueen, James Garner, Richard Attenborough, Charles Bronson, James Coburn, (168 min)
 McQueen rides that cycle, Garner scrumples, Attenborough provides formal leadership, Bronson – perhaps remembering his beginnings as Charles Buchinsky in Pennsylvania's coal country – gets tunnel claustrophobia, and Coburn is "the life-guard." In Sturges' rip-roaring recreation of the greatest prisoner of war mass escape of WWII, based on the book by participant Paul Brickhill. One of the best all-star WWII action films made in the 1960s – a critically fruitful decade for that genre.

THOMAS CRUEN AFFAIR
 NEW 35MM PRINT!
 at 4:00, 9:30
 (1968) dir Norman Jewison w/Steve McQueen, Faye Dunaway (102 min)
 One of Steve McQueen's most thrilling roles is as the bored Bescon Hill playboy, Thomas Crown, who gets together a crack team of crooks and robs a bank just for the thrill of it. Crown thinks he's gotten off clean but he doesn't expect to meet his match in sultry, determined insurance investigator Vicki Anderson (Dunaway). Some great Boston locations and that memorable chess scene highlight this terrific heist flick.

25TH ANNIVERSARY!
ZELIG
 at 3:30, 7:30
 (1983) dir Woody Allen w/Allen, Mia Farrow (79 min)
ZELIG, one of Woody Allen's most adventurous films, is a 'documentary' about the title character of Leonard Zelig, a gifted (and obsessive) chameleon who can mimic anyone around him. Using innovative trick photography Allen inserts himself as Zelig into some of the early 20th century's most significant moments. Not really a mockumentary but definitely a comedy, *ZELIG* explores the theoretical historical and personal impact of this fascinating man who never existed.

 (1983) dir Terry Jones & Terry Gilliam w/Graham Chapman, John Cleese, Gilliam, Eric Idle, Jones, Michael Palin, Carol Cleveland (107 min)

OPERATION FILMMAKER
 at 5:30, 7:30, 9:30 (+ Sat & Sun at 1:30, 3:30), Tue at 8:00, 10:00
 (2007) dir Nina Davenport w/Liev Schreiber, Muthana Mohamed (92 min)
 In 2004, American actor Liev Schreiber saw an MTV segment on Iraqi film student Muthana Mohamed, whose dreams of becoming a filmmaker had been thwarted by the bombing of his university during "Operation Iraqi Freedom." Schreiber, then preparing to film his directorial debut, *Everything is Illuminated*, in Prague, invited Muthana to work on the film. Documentary filmmaker (and Harvard graduate) Nina Davenport was hired to document Muthana's experience as an intern on the set of his film. Schreiber's well-intentioned gesture doesn't result in the inspiring story everyone had hoped for, as differing expectations and agendas clash. In particular, Muthana begrudgingly performs or shirks responsibility for the tasks assigned to him, repeatedly squandering a golden opportunity.

For *OPERATION FILMMAKER*, Davenport chronicled Muthana's story over a two-year period – from his work in Prague as a P.A. on Schreiber's film and later on the sci-fi film *Doom*, to a stint at a London film school – and finally follows up with his experiences abroad with scenes of his family and friends in war-torn Baghdad. While documenting Muthana's relationships with the producers, crews and stars of both films – characterized by a psychologically fascinating sense of good intentions, bad faith, liberal guilt, and opportunism – Davenport herself eventually becomes embroiled in the young man's perennial financial difficulties and visa problems. In its continuing but futile search for a "happy ending," *OPERATION FILMMAKER* exposes the often mutually manipulative relationships between filmmakers and their subjects.

 (1986) dir Derek Jarman w/Nigel Terry, Tilda Swinton, Sean Bean, Robbie Coltrane, Michael Gough (93 min)
 Cinemental presents a rare screening of Derek Jarman's *CARAVAGGIO* as a follow up to our co-presentation of Isaac Julian's documentary *Derek* screening at the Museum of Fine Arts on Monday, May 19th. *CARAVAGGIO* is the quintessential Cinemental film. It is Jarman's sumptuous vision of art, sex and violence and the complicated relationship between painting and film.

NO COUNTRY FOR OLD MEN
 at 4:30, 7:30, 9:30 (+ Sat & Sun at 2:00)
 (2007) dir Joel & Ethan Coen w/Tommy Lee Jones, Josh Brolin, Javier Bardem, Kelly Macdonald, Woody Harrelson (122 min)
 This adaptation of Pulitzer Prize winner Cormac McCarthy's novel finds hunter Lewellyn Moss (Brolin) stumbling upon a drug deal gone sour. Set in a series of desolate Texas border-towns, *NO COUNTRY FOR OLD MEN* exists in a world of expansive lawlessness. Sparse, beautiful and also terrifyingly alienating, the film chronicles Lewellyn's attempt to escape with two million dollars in drug money. Unable to simply walk away with such a sizable sum, Lewellyn is pursued by both the crumbling local police force and a series of criminals, most aggressively, the calculating, ruthless Anton Chigurh (Bardem). Embodying a nihilistic, western-classic *NO COUNTRY FOR OLD MEN* is one of the most critically hailed films of 2008 and was awarded both Best Picture and Best Director of the Academy Awards.

WEST SIDE STORY
 NEW 35MM PRINT!

 (1961) dir Robert Wise w/Natalie Wood, Richard Beymer, Russ Tamblyn, Rita Moreno (162 min)
 New York street gangs the Jets and the Sharks duke it out via dance fight in this urban retelling of *Romeo and Juliet*. Natalie Wood stars as Maria, a teenager who falls in love with the leader of the rival gang. The product of the powerhouse pairing of Leonard Bernstein and Stephen Sondheim, *WEST SIDE STORY* features musical greats such as "America" and "I Feel Pretty." Hailed as one of the greatest musicals of all time and the winner of 10 academy awards, *WEST SIDE STORY* is not to be missed on the big screen.

Monday, May 12 & Tuesday, May 13
SOME LIKE IT HOT
 at 4:30, 9:30
 (1959) dir Billy Wilder w/Marilyn Monroe, Tony Curtis, Jack Lemmon, George Raft (121 min)
 A buddy comedy with a twist, *Joe* (Curtis) and Jerry (Lemmon) are two musicians who witness a mob hit during the St. Valentine's Day Massacre. They are found out and quickly need to wrangle enough cash to get out of town, however, the only paying gig around is in an all-female band. Mustering up their courage (and their pants) in a way that is, well, and amazingly, pass – as women, securing their place in the band and their salvation from the mob. However, things become more complicated when Joe falls for their gorgeous band mate (Monroe), and Jerry finds himself with his own problems after he catches the eye of a male suitor who won't take no for an answer.

THE APARTMENT
 at 4:30, 9:30, Tue at 7:00, 9:30
 (1960) dir Barry Levinson w/Jack Lemmon, Shirley MacLaine, Fred MacMurray (125 min)
 The great Billy Wilder made 10 pictures under the United Artists banner and this is one of the sharpest. Lemmon, as the low man on the corporate ladder, seeks his morals for a higher rung by lending his eye of his Upper West Side bachelor pad to his superiors for extra-marital trysts. Complications ensue when he falls for the office's favorite elevator girl (MacLaine) who happens to be his boss's mistress.

Monday, May 19 & Tuesday, May 20
RAISING ARIZONA
 Mon at 8:00, Tue at 7:30
 (1987) dir Joel & Ethan Coen w/Nicolas Cage, Holly Hunter, Trey Wilson, John Goodman, William Forsythe (94 min)
 In his directorial debut, the Coen Brothers' breakthrough hit has ever appeared on the Brattle screen. Absurdly disheveled ex-con H.I. 
